NOTICE OF RACE

The notation '[NP]' in a rule means that a boat may not protest another boat for breaking that rule. This changes RRS 60.1 (a). The notation '[DP]' in a rule of the NOR or SI means that the penalty for breaching the rule is at the discretion of the protest committee and may be less than disqualification.

1 **RULES**

- 1.1 The event is governed by the rules as defined in The Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS).
- 1.2 RRS Appendix T applies.
- 1.3 [NP] The Organising Authority implements the 420 Class Charter which can be viewed at https://gbr420.uk/the-420-class/policies,-documents-and-minutes/ and the RYA Racing Charter available at www.rya.org.uk/racing/pages/racingcharter.aspx. Competitors shall undertake to sail in compliance with the charters.
- RRS 40.1 applies at all times whilst afloat. 1.4
- RRS 63.7 is changed so that in the event of a conflict between the Notice of Race 1.5 and Sailing Instructions, the Sailing Instructions shall prevail.
- 1.6 [DP] Entrants and authorised guests are temporary members of HISC during the period of the event and shall comply with club rules and bylaws. Failure to observe these may result in exclusion from the club premises.

2 **SAILING INSTRUCTIONS**

2.1 The sailing instructions will be published on the GBR 420 class website by 17:00 on Wednesday 23th March

3 COMMUNICATION

3.1 The online official notice board is located at 420 Selector Event 2 (hisc.co.uk) Copies of these notices may also be displayed on the notice board in the main entrance of HISC

- 3.2 [DP] While racing (from the first warning signal until the end of the last race of the day), except in an emergency, a boat shall not make voice or data transmissions and shall not receive voice or data communication that is not available to all boats.
- 3.3 Competitors should note that it is anticipated that all communication for this event will be on line. The HISC WiFi system may not be accessible and they must have a device which can connect to the internet via an alternative means.
- 3.4 Hearings may be held remotely under procedures which will be set out in the Sailing Instructions.

4 ELIGIBILITY AND ENTRY

- 4.1 The regatta is open to all boats of the International 420 class sailed by helms and crews who are members or affiliates of the International 420 Class Association. At registration, competitors may be required to show evidence of membership of their affiliated organisation.
- 4.2 Eligible boats shall enter by completing the online entry form accessed via the GBR 420 Class Association website, paying the entry fee and completing registration by midnight Sunday 20th March.
- 4.3 No late entries will be accepted.
- 4.4 Parent/Guardian Declarations: All helms and crews under 18 years of age during the event shall submit signed Parent/Guardian Declarations on-line as part of the entry process and submit details of the parent acting in loco parentis to 420classoffice@gmail.com.
- 4.5 Medical forms and sailor declarations included as part of the on-line entry are required to be completed for all competitors.
- 4.6 Competitors may apply for temporary weekend membership of the British International 420 Class (UK) Association by email to 420saillingsecretary@gmail.com. Competitors applying for Temporary Membership may only do so for one Regatta organised by the Class Association.

5 FEES

5.1 The Entry Fee will be set out on the Class Association website and shall be paid via the online payment system

6 IDENTIFICATION & ADVERTISING

[NP] [DP] When provided by the Organising Authority, boats shall display bow numbers and/or advertising.

7 EVENT SERIES

- 7.1 The regatta will consist of a single series of races.
- 7.2 The regatta will form part of a 3 regatta major event selection series, details of which are published on the GBR 420 Class Association Website

8 SCHEDULE

8.1 There will be no in-person registration. All competitors should download the NOR, Si's and joining Instructions prior to the event Event: Selector 2 2022 (HISC)

- (ourclubadmin.com) and be aware of the official noticeboard located here: 420 Selector Event 2 (hisc.co.uk)
- 8.2 [DP] Each boat shall supply sail button numbers using the process described in the SIs for up to two main sails, two jibs and two spinnakers by 21:00 on 25th March 2022 and only these sails shall be used in the regatta. This amends Class Rule C10.2.2.
- 8.3 Competitor Briefing: a competitor briefing will be held on Saturday 26th March at 0930.
- 8.4 Format of Racing: It is intended to run a maximum of 8 races over the two days. The intended format is as follows, the Race Committee may adjust this over the weekend:

Day	First Warning Signal	Intended no. of races
26th March 2022	10:55hrs	4 races back to back
27th March 2022	10:25hrs	4 races back to back

8.4 On the last scheduled day of racing no warning signal will be made after 14:30.

9 EQUIPMENT INSPECTION

- 9.1 A boat shall produce a valid measurement certificate if requested by the 420 Class. This may be in electronic format.
- 9.2 [DP] Boats, sails and equipment may be inspected for class rules compliance prior to, during or after racing.
- 9.3 [DP] [NP] Class Rule C.5.2.b)1) applies: The boat shall be fitted with a floating towing rope of a minimum length of 8 m and minimum diameter of 8 mm, secured to the mast.

10 VENUE

10.1 The venue will be Hayling Island Sailing Club - Sandy Point, Hayling Island, Hampshire, PO11 9SL

11 COURSES

11.1 The Course(s) to be sailed will be detailed in the SIs.

12 PENALTY SYSTEM

- 12.1 The penalty system will be described in the SIs.
- 12.2 RRS Appendix P, Special Procedures for Rule 42, will apply as described in the SI's.
- 12.3 To encourage boats to take a penalty afloat, judges may blow a whistle when they see what they believe to be a breach of a rule.

13 SCORING

- 13.1 One race is required to be completed to constitute a series.
- 13.2 (a) When fewer than 4 races have been completed a boat's series score shall be the total of her race scores.

(b) When 4 or more races have been completed, a boats series score will be the total of her race score excluding her worst score.

14 SUPPORT PERSON VESSELS

- 14.1 Support person vessels shall be allowed and shall be expected to act as part of the safety fleet if requested to do so by the Race Committee.
- 14.2 Official, Patrol and Support person vessels may be required to be marked with an appropriate coloured flag and shall comply with instructions from the event safety officer.
- 14.3 [DP] Team leaders, coaches and other support personnel including relatives of competitors who are not official, patrol or support person vessels shall not be in the racing area, nor shall they communicate with any competitors, from the time of the preparatory signal for the first race until the last boat returns to shore. The penalty for failing to comply with this requirement will be at the discretion of the protest committee and may be less than disqualification for all boats associated with the support personnel who do so.
 - a) For the purposes of this rule, the racing area shall be defined as not less than 300m from any boat that is racing, and this shall specifically include an area not less than 200m immediately to leeward of the finish line for any race.
 - b) For events that are held in restricted waters where the requirements in 14.3 a) are unable to be met, the Race Officer may designate a specific area for team leaders, coaches or support boats
- 14.4 Competitors will be allowed to place a single bag of spares, food and drink on a designated on water support vessel. This will be identified in the briefing.

15 BERTHING

15.1 [DP] Boats shall be kept in their assigned places in the dinghy park for the duration of the regatta unless instructed otherwise.

16 CHARTERED OR LOANED BOATS

16.1 A chartered or loaned boat may carry national letters or a sail number in contravention of her class rules, provided the race committee has approved her sail identification and bow number before the first race.

17 DATA PROTECTION

17.1 PRIVACY STATEMENT The personal information you provide to the organising authority will be used to facilitate your participation in the event. If you have agreed to be bound by the Racing Rules of Sailing and the other rules that govern the event (the rules), the legal basis for processing that personal information is contract. If you are not bound by the rules, the legal basis for processing that personal information is legitimate interest. Your personal information will be stored and used in accordance with the organising authority's privacy policy. When required by the rules, personal information may be shared with the RYA, your national authority and/or World Sailing. The results of the event and the outcome of any hearing or appeal may be published.

18 RIGHTS TO USE NAMES AND LIKENESS

18.1 Competitors automatically grant to the organising authority and their sponsors without payment the right in perpetuity to make, use and show any motion pictures, still pictures and live, taped or filmed television of or relating to the event.

19 RISK STATEMENT

- 19.1 RRS 3 states: "The responsibility for a boat's decision to participate in a race or to continue racing is hers alone." By participating in this event each competitor agrees and acknowledges that sailing is a potentially dangerous activity with inherent risks. These risks include strong winds and rough seas, sudden changes in weather, failure of equipment, boat handling errors, poor seamanship by other boats, loss of balance on an unstable platform and fatigue resulting in increased risk of injury. Inherent in the sport of sailing is the risk of permanent, catastrophic injury or death by drowning, trauma, hypothermia of other causes. By taking part in the event, each competitor agrees and acknowledges that:
 - (a) They are aware of the inherent element of risk involved in the sport and accept responsibility for the exposure of themselves, their crew and their boat to such inherent risk whilst taking part in the event;
 - (b) They are responsible for the safety of themselves, their crew, their boat and their other property whether afloat or ashore;
 - (c) They accept responsibility for any injury, damage or loss to the extent caused by their own actions or omissions;
 - (d) Their boat is in good order, equipped to sail in the event and they are fit to participate;
 - (e) The provision of a race management team, patrol boats and other officials and volunteers by the event organiser does not relieve them of their own responsibilities;
 - (f) The provision of patrol boat cover is limited to such assistance, particularly in extreme weather conditions, as can be practically provided in the circumstances:
 - (g) It is their responsibility to familiarise themselves with any risks specific to this venue or this event drawn to their attention in any rules and information produced for the venue or event and to attend any competitor briefing held for the event.

20 INSURANCE

20.1 Each participating boat shall be insured with valid third-party liability insurance with a minimum cover of £3,000,000 per incident or the equivalent. Sailors or Owners of competing 420s may be asked to provide evidence the competing boat is insured.

21 PRIZES

21.1 Prizes will be awarded depending on entry numbers.

22 CANCELLATION

22.1 If the event is canceled more than 24 hours before the start of the event a full refund will be given. Notice of any cancellation will be posted on the GBR 420 Class Association website.
